CAVC Awards and Installation Banquet

The Annual CAVC Awards and Installation Banquet takes place 18 March 2016, starting at 6:00 pm at Chattanooga Convention Center. Advance reservations are required. Individual cost is \$30 per person. A table of 8 will be \$225.

The dinner menu includes London Broil or Salmon, Chef Choice Vegetable, Chef Choice Starch, Warm Rolls, Garden Market Salad, New York Cheese Cake, Tea, water, and coffee.

The guest speaker will be Captain Christopher M. Cotton, USMC. Captain Cotton assumed the duties as Inspector-Instructor, Battery M, Third Battalion, 14th Marine Regiment on 31 July 2014.



He enlisted in the Marine Corps in December 1996 and attended Recruit Training at MCRD, San Diego. In April 1997, Private Cotton reported to Marine Aviation Training Support Group-21 (MATSG-21) in Pensacola, Florida where he completed the Basic Aviation Electrician's (AE) Course. Upon Completion of the AE Course, Private First Class Cotton continued his electrical education, and attended MOS school in Lemoore, California. After graduating from MOS school, he was designated as a 6337, F/A-18 Electrician.

In February 1998, Lance Corporal Cotton reported to his first FMF duty station, VMFA-232 Red Devils, in Miramar, California. While serving as an electrician, he deployed to Iwakuni, Japan. He held multiple billets, including Shop Supervisor, Collateral Duty Inspector, and Plane Captain. During his tour with the Red Devils, he was promoted to Corporal and Sergeant.

In January 2001, Sergeant Cotton returned to MATSG-21 in Pensacola, Florida where he served as an instructor at the AE schoolhouse. While serving as an instructor, he attended Sergeants Course in Quantico, Virginia and was selected for the Marine Enlisted Commissioning Education Program (MECEP). He reported as a MECEP student to the University of Idaho, in August 2002. During the summer of 2003 Staff Sergeant Cotton attended Officer Candidate School. He graduated from the University of Idaho in December 2005 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Conservation Science.

In April 2006, Second Lieutenant Cotton attended The Basic School (TBS) in Quantico, Virginia. Upon completion of TBS he reported to Fort Sill, Oklahoma, where he was designated as an 0802, Field Artillery Officer. In April 2007, he reported to Battery F, 2d Battalion, 10th Marines. While serving with Battery F, Second Lieutenant Cotton deployed in support of OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM as the Officer in Charge, Regional Detention Facility, Fallujah. Upon returning from Iraq, First Lieutenant Cotton was assigned as the Executive Officer for Battery F. After serving as the Battery Executive Officer, he was selected to serve as the Aide de Camp for Richard T. Tryon, Commanding General, 2d Marine Division and Commanding General, Multi National Force-West.

In July, 2010, Captain Cotton attended the Expeditionary Warfare School. Upon completion, he was assigned to 3d Battalion, 11th Marines, where he served as Commanding Officer of Headquarters Battery, Battery I and Battery M. Captain Cotton also served as the Assistant Fires Support Coordinator and Battalion Logistics Officer. He deployed to Okinawa, Japan in support of the Unit Deployment Program and Ulaan Batar, Mongolia in support of Exercise KHAAN QUEST.

Election Commission looking for more veterans

As you know, the Presidential Primary Election will be held on March 1, 2016 and The Hamilton County Election Commission is in need of additional poll workers. Many veterans active in the Chattanooga Area Veterans Council are working with the Election Commission but they would like to have more. Below are answers to some frequently asked questions that should prove to be helpful.

Frequently Asked Questions:

· Will I be paid to work on Election Day?
 Yes. Your income will depend on the duty you perform, but the range is from \$100 to \$160 for the Officer of Election.

· Will training be provided?
 Yes. As a new worker, you will attend one required training session and you will be paid \$20 to attend this class.
 2016 Training dates: January 10 - 14 & January 18 - 23
 Attend one training session, which usually lasts around 2 hours. A morning and afternoon session will be offered, as well as one Saturday.

· What will the hours be on Election Day?
 You will need to report to your assigned polling location no later than 7:00am. You are required to stay at the polling place until the polls close at 8:00pm and all of the election equipment has been properly stored.

· What should I bring with me?
 You should bring food, beverages and any medications you are required to take for the day. You may also bring a book or magazines.

· Job Requirements:
 You must be a registered voter in Hamilton County OR at least 17 years old and a resident of Hamilton County. You must be willing to commit to work the full 14 hours on Election Day. You must be able to understand and follow written directions. You must be willing to attend the training session before each election. You will be cross-trained and expected to perform multiple jobs.

NOTE: Government employees cannot be election officials. School teachers and employees of higher education may work. While there is no law against it, close relatives of candidates on the ballot will not be hired.

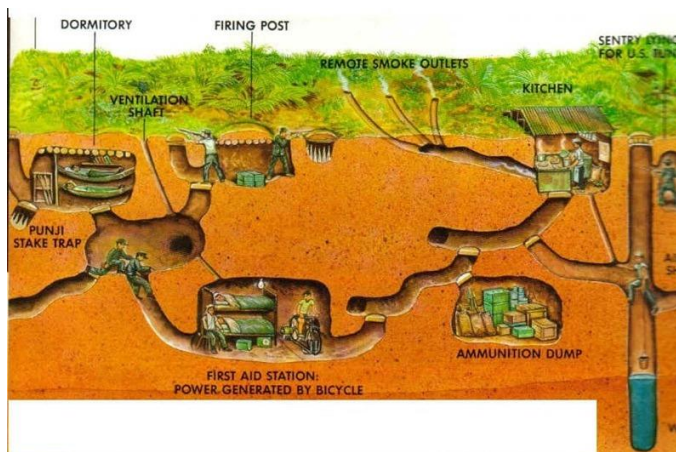

FIFTY YEARS AGO IN VIETNAM – JANUARY 1966

General Westmoreland's three point plan to "win the war" by 1967 was endorsed by the Secretary of Defense and his recommendation that overall troop strength be increased to 400,000 personnel was approved by President Johnson. Thus began a build-up in 1966 of U.S. and Allied troops that would double their number by the end of the year.

The air war over North Vietnam, Operation Rolling Thunder, and the bombing by the B-52's in Operation Arc Light resumed with a vengeance after the six day Christmas "truce". However, the military was frustrated by the direct involvement of President Johnson in the approval of targets for the air war. The system he set up provided that on every Thursday morning a target list was presented to him by the Pentagon. At lunch the President and his advisors picked the targets that were approved for the following week. This process frustrated military planners on the ground and often hampered the air war against mobile targets like the SAM Batteries.

On January 7, 1966 approximately 8,000 U.S. and Australian Army forces launched Operation CRIMP, a massive, joint search and destroy operation in a region about 25 miles northwest of Saigon. The operation included forces from the U.S. Army 3rd Brigade, 1st Infantry Division, and the 173rd Airborne Brigade, as well as the 1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment. Their objective was to locate and destroy the Viet Cong headquarters and stronghold believed to be in that area. When allied forces located their objective, they discovered it actually was underground, contained in a vast network of tunnels. Some 7,500 documents and maps were found there, many of which revealed the names and locations of Viet Cong agents and other actionable intelligence. It became one of the biggest allied intelligence coups of the war.



The operation occurred in the Ho Bo Woods, a region that was largely open terrain punctuated by thick jungle and abandoned rubber plantations. Over the course of a week, CRIMP forces fought sporadic engagements with guerrillas and seized thousands of pounds of supplies, weapons, and rice in numerous caches. While firefights with Viet Cong forces were intermittent, dense fields of booby traps and landmines caused numerous allied casualties, and in some units these devices killed more allied soldiers than did enemy fire.

On January 15, 1965, Major Kathleen I. Wilkes and Sergeant Betty L. Adams of the U.S. Women's Army Corps (WAC) arrived in Saigon. They were the second and the third women to serve in Vietnam as part of the WAC, and the first since 1963.

Wilkes and Adams served primarily in and around Saigon. Their mission was to train members of the recently established South Vietnamese Women's Armed Forces Corps. Wilkes and Adams - along with Major Ann Marie Doering who served in Vietnam in 1962-1963-were some of the first of what eventually became some 12,000 American women who served their country in Vietnam. The precise number of women who served, however, is not known, due to the limited records kept during the period, as well as the multitude of women who served as civilians outside the regular military's structure. Eight



women died while serving in Vietnam, each of them nurses, and have had their names engraved on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall, in Washington, D.C.

On January 24th, in the largest search-and-destroy operation to date - Operation Masher/White Wing/Thang Phong II - the U.S. 1st Cavalry Division (Airmobile), South Vietnamese, and Korean forces swept through Binh Dinh Province in the central lowlands along the coast. The purpose of the operation was to drive the North Vietnamese out of the province and destroy enemy supply areas. In late January, it became the first large unit operation conducted across corps boundaries when the cavalrymen linked up with Double Eagle, a U.S. Marine Corps operation intended to destroy the North Vietnamese 325A Division. Altogether, there were reported enemy casualties of 2,389 by the time the operation ended.

We currently have all the tickets purchased for the folks from out of town, we have the hotel rooms, and we have most of the food vendors ready. We are bringing in representatives from US Sailing. One of them happens to be the most decorated US Sailing sailor; Betsy Allison. She has won every type of race out there from the Olympics on down. She is a personal friend and fantastic advocate for veterans.



We hope that through a grant we are pursuing with the Veterans Administration we can establish an adaptive sailing center and school here in Chattanooga over the next two years. This sailing center would not only help veterans but be available for non-veterans as well - something we hope the city/county can tie into. We believe that this could be another marketing interest for the city as it continues its quest to tout itself as the outdoor city.

We currently have three wounded veterans from the area that have committed to the week-long event. We are hoping to recruit others so that we have the full five we need and then a couple of additional persons in case of no-shows. We hope to have others who can't commit to the time required for this event come out and see what it is about to participate in future events. I have four more additional sailing events for this year. This event is open to all veterans. We have participants from Vietnam era through today coming.

So you have situational awareness on the 23rd of April; UTC is hosting a seated volleyball tournament for R.O.V.E.R.. This is to introduce a new sport and opportunity for both able and adaptive veterans as well as kids to compete with friends and peers, and if they are inclined to pursue a chance in the pipeline for the para-olympics. We will have one of the National coaches from the US Para Olympic Team coming. We are working to bring in other college volleyball teams, Fraternity/Sorority participation, corporate teams, and area high school volleyball teams. This sport can be played by anyone as you can see from the video in the link https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=wxp3klvgT_o. Coach Huseman is going to be putting some of his football team on the floor to compete. We are attempting to bring in the US SOCOM team I compete with, they are in the train up phase for the DOD Warrior Games in June. This event will serve as a fundraiser as well as also show case to area kids that even if you are ill or injured there are other sports and events you can try.

We ask for your assistance in putting the word out about forming teams to compete.

We will start working the media presentation piece toward the latter part of this month. It will be put in surrounding newspapers and electronic media outlets.
